1 Alcatraz

Okay, yes, it's touristy. And yes, it's still fun to tell people that you went to jail when you visited San Francisco. But seriously, if you've never visited the famous (or should we say infamous) **Alcatraz Island**, about a mile offshore in the San Francisco Bay, it might be time to plan an excursion to see the nowclosed federal prison that once housed some pretty notorious criminals.

2 Big Sur

Located just south of Monterey, <u>Big Sur</u> is a 90-mile stretch of mountainous land along the central coast that's nothing short of spectacular. As the Santa Lucia mountains rise up on one side and the Pacific Ocean sparkles on the other, Highway 1 rolls out in front of you and begs you to drive the whole route. You could start at the north end in Carmel and make your way south to San Simeon, home to the famous <u>Hearst Castle</u>, which is a registered National and California Historic Landmark.

Golden Gate Park

You really can't visit San Francisco and not visit Golden Gate Park. After all, 24 million annual visitors can't be wrong. This urban oasis is home to attractions such as the San Francisco Botanical Garden, the California Academy of Sciences, and the <u>de Young Museum</u>, a fine art museum, as well as the <u>Japanese Tea Garden</u>, the oldest public Japanese garden in the nation.

4 Google campus

Your most tech-savvy friends will be impressed when they see your Instagram photos of yourself in front of the famous Google sign in Mountain View. The Google campus, or Googleplex, doesn't offer any official tours, but you can stroll around and see the public art. Plus, you might love seeing the amazing **Shorebird Egret Rookery**, located on a street in the middle of campus. Nesting season for these large majestic white birds is February through September. (You might see some black-crowned night-herons, too!)

Lake Tahoe

Unlike many of the places on this list, <u>Lake Tahoe</u> is not located near the coast. Instead, this beautiful freshwater lake is located in the Sierra Nevada Mountains where California and Nevada meet. Did we mention beautiful? Because beautiful is practically synonymous for Lake Tahoe. Take the <u>72-mile scenic drive</u> around the lake so you can stop along the way to visit the beaches, the Tahoe Maritime Museum, Squaw Valley USA (site of the 1980 Winter Olympics), and <u>Cave Rock Vista Point</u>, among others. Love hiking? This is the place for you, since hiking trails and amazing views abound.

6 Monterey



Check out the rest of Cannery Row, a scenic street full of art galleries, restaurants, wine tasting rooms, and other attractions. If you've visiting during warm weather, consider kayaking or scuba diving in the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. You could also take a whale watching tour or since it's a public golf course, play a round at the Pebble Beach Golf Links in nearby Pebble Beach.

Stanford University

Want to tell people that you went to Stanford? Then plan a visit during your travel nursing assignment in Northern California! Located in Palo Alto, Stanford University is known for its intensely-focused student body and topi notch academics. But it's a pretty great place for you to visit, too. You can take a selfguided walk around the huge campus and perhaps even drop by the **Cantor Arts Center**, which is free and offers an impressive array of ongoing and changing exhibitions.

8 Redwood National and State Parks

Marvel over the world's tallest trees at Redwood National and State Parks, which includes Redwood National, Prairie Creek, Del Norte Coast, and Jedediah Smith Redwoods State Parks. Plan to take a lot of photos here!

Tours of San Francisco

A great way to see San Francisco when you don't want to attempt to drive yourself is a guided tour. Bonus: someone else can tell you exactly what you're looking at. One fun option is a **bus tour** of the city's famous colorful Victorian mansions known as the Painted Ladies (also known as Postcard Row). Prefer to go on foot? Consider a walking tour of Chinatown so you can explore the history, food, and culture of this vibrant section of the city. Or a tour of the Italian restaurants and other culinary landmarks in San Francisco's **North Beach** neighborhood. You might find a favorite that you can return to , again and again.

Sacramento

A little further inland from the coast is California's capital, Sacramento. Eat, drink, shop and be merry in the <u>Handle district</u>, explore the exhibits at the <u>Crocker Art Museum</u>, or learn more about your adopted home state and by visiting the <u>California State Capitol Museum</u> or <u>Sutter's Fort State Historic Park</u>.

11 Yosemite

If your idea of the perfect adventure involves waterfalls and wildlife, Yosemite National Park is waiting for you. This national park is located east of San Francisco and Sacramento in the Sierra Madres, with seemingly endless opportunities for hiking, camping, and wildlifespotting. Spring and summer are great times to fish, hike, and visit one of the park's five waterfalls that are over 1,000 feet tall. If you visit in the summer, opt for a guided astronomy walk so you can learn more about the stars above, raft down the Merced River, or book a nighttime bike tour. Pack your snow boots if you plan to visit in the winter for another type of adventure.

Wine Country

Red or white? How about both, and throw in some sparkling wine, too. Northern California is famous for its wine country. You could begin touring wineries in **Napa Valley** and try to decide which Cabernet or chardonnay is your fave, or you could start with **Sonoma Valley** and try all the pinot noirs and Zinfandels. Or divide your time between both. You can even book tours, so you don't have to figure it out yourself.
